
WELCOME TO OUR NEWSLETTER!



- Children who read at least 20 minutes a day are exposed to almost 2 million words per year.

Promoting Reading for Pleasure at Home

Why do it?

There is strong evidence that links reading for pleasure and educational outcomes; research suggests that reading for 30 minutes a week increases health and wellbeing. Reading for pleasure has been found to improve our confidence and self-esteem, providing the grounding we need to pursue our goals and make life decisions. Reading for pleasure helps us to understand our own identities, improves empathy and gives us an insight into the world view of others.

How can parents/carers help?

As adults, we read all of the time but children often don't see us doing this or are unaware we are actually reading. We need to make sure that children see that we are reading and why we are doing it.

The things that we read fall into 2 categories

- Reading to inform e.g. the news/recipes/instruction manuals
- Reading for pleasure e.g. fiction books..

When reading, take the time to explain to your children what you are reading and why you are reading it. This will normalise the behaviour in the house and children will see it as an option of something to do rather than something they have to do for school.
