Trinity

Trinity children have had a great week getting creative! The children decorated their own cupcakes with amazing designs. Staff were all very impressed with the care the children took. I'm sure their parents and carers will enjoy tasting the cakes brought home. The children also created some beautiful handmade gifts to take home alongside their cakes.





Nursery

We continued learning about dinosaurs this week. The children loved using the magnifying glasses to look more closely at dinosaur fossils. They made some comments about what they could see.

Outside learning is an essential part of our curriculum. We have spent this week getting our outdoor area ready for our children to use. From next week all children will have access to all areas of the outdoors. **Please ensure that they have wellington boots in the nursery!**



Reception

This week the children have been focusing on the properties of 3D shapes. We used a ramp to test which shapes roll and which would slide. Children noticed that the 3D shapes with curved faces, such as a cylinder, were able to roll. The shapes with flat faces tended to slowly slide down the ramp!!



Our RE question this week was: Why did Jesus go to a special garden? We talked about when Jesus went to the garden of Gethsemane to pray and the children talked about their own special prayers and where they pray. They went on to create their own images of the special garden of Gethsemane.

During this week's literacy session, we read to the end of the story 'Wild' by Emily Hughes. The children used great vocabulary to predict the end and went on to re-count the story in lots of detail.



Year 1

The children in year 1 had lots of fun celebrating World Book Day this week. As well as listening to lots of stories, the children took part in a fun art activity where collected leaves from our playground and created leaf rubbings with a variety of art mediums. These included; charcoal, acrylic paints, watercolours and oil pastels. This activity was closely related to the whole school story that we listened to called 'Our Tower' by Joseph Coelho. During our science lesson we have also been looking at plants and leaves and understanding how plants grow as well as observing seasonal changes through trees. In maths, the children will be moving on to understanding length and height. Please talk to your child about things that are 'taller', 'shorter', 'longer' 'smaller' to help them gain and understanding of the everyday language used to describe length and height.



Year 2

This week the children worked tirelessly to complete their Reading mock SATs. It was so encouraging to see so many children displaying resilience and determination, as they did their best with their exams. We were impressed at the huge amount of progress the children have made since September. It was also refreshing to hear comments the children that realised how important the additional practice of the homework have been to their success. I would like to take this opportunity to also thank all the adults for the support and their contributions towards completing the tests with groups and individuals.



Year 3

Year 3 went to Lee Valley Leisure Centre on Monday. The children had so much fun learning how to correctly throw a javelin and how to do a long jump. We also had a go at sprinting, where we discovered how speedy some of our children are. We think we have some future Olympians in this year group.

Year 4

Year 4 had an enjoyable week. On Tuesday, we visited The Cutty Sark as part of our Topic on trade and Transport. They learnt that it was a Clipper ship which carried cargo such as tea from Indonesia to England.

Furthermore, we listened to famous artists read books for World Book day and participated in a BBC book workshop.



Year 5

On Monday, Year 5 visited The Ragged School Museum. We experienced a day in the life of a child at school in the Victorian era. The children were shocked to see the differences – the strict nature of the teacher, no left hand writers and the use of chalkboards rather than paper. They also got to see the home life of Victorians and how much of a difference it is to what they see and experience today.

This trip has definitely allowed the children to see how different our lives are now in comparison.

A special mention to our very own Miss Looby who came dressed for the trip in full Victorian teacher's costume- Awesome!





Year 6

Children have worked very hard this week producing some diary entries; they imagined what it was like to be Anne Frank during WW2. Their entries focused on what life was like in Amsterdam in June 1942 for a young Jewish girl. They used topic vocabulary (outcast, discrimination, prejudice...) to help the reader to empathise with Anne.

Our RE lessons this week were centred around the stations of the cross. The children explored the question- How does Jesus' journey to the cross offer signs of hope? We also spent time looking at and discussing the following vocabulary:

Salvation: To be rescued/saved by God. Relationship between God and humankind is restored.

Forgiveness: To 'let go' of those things that hurt us.

Redemption: Being freed from sin by Jesus' death.

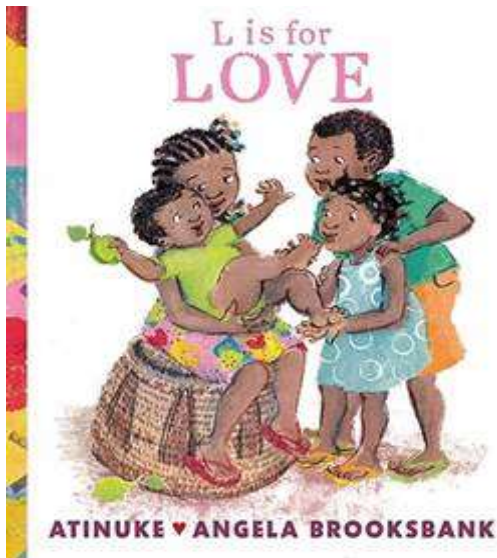

However, when the little monster climbs up onto the bed and snuggles down with a cuddly teddy, his eyes start to close... perhaps little monsters like normal bedtimes, too



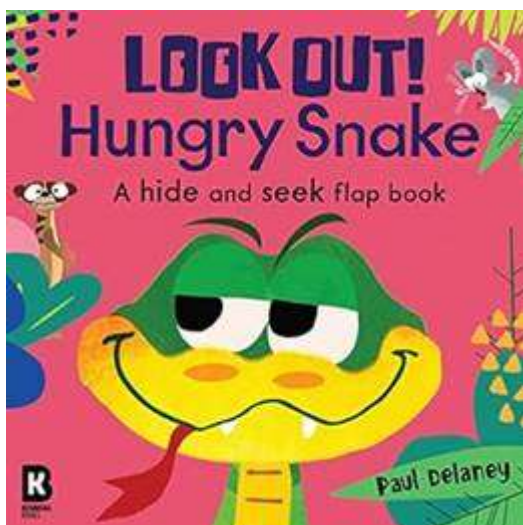
L is For Love

Author: Paul Delaney

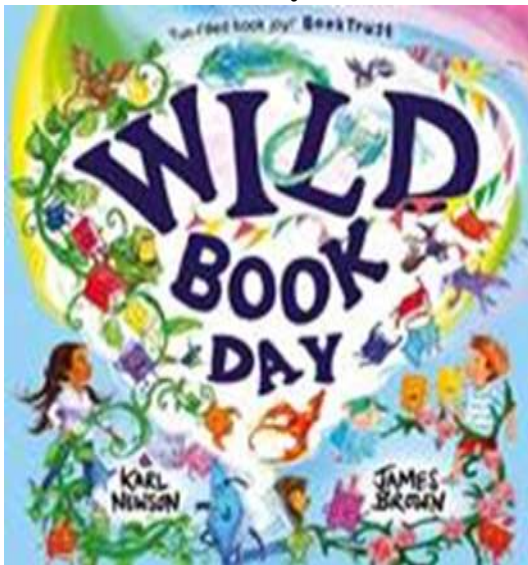

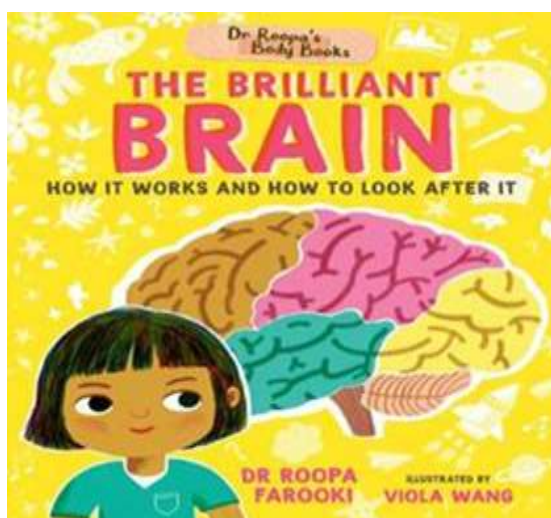

Mama tells Noor of the 'henna name game' where the henna artist will hide the groom's name in the bride's intricately painted henna design and the groom must find it. Noor loves this funny game of hide-and-seek and wants to join in. But whose name should she choose?



Dr Roopa's Body Books: The Brilliant Brain

Every second of the day, something is happening in your body – and your brain is controlling it all! Your brain is responsible for your thoughts, feelings and memories, but also telling your legs to walk and your lungs to breathe. And it makes you you!

This is a simple introduction to the way the brain works and, although it is a complicated topic, Dr Roopa Farooki explains the brain's many functions in a clear, child-friendly way. There are a few technical terms, such as 'cerebrum' and 'cerebellum', which are defined, and the pronunciation is spelled out, to aid the reader.

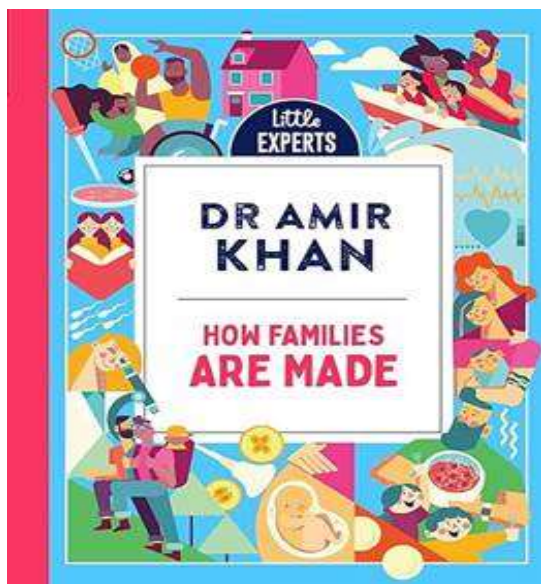
Time Travellers: Adventure Calling

Sahana, Ayaan and Mia and three Londoners are on a trip to visit the Houses of Parliament, after being shortlisted for an art competition. They are fascinated by all the history and then somehow Sahana's mobile phone time travels them all to 1911! Here, in Parliament's Westminster Hall, Sahana and her friends are astonished to meet some fascinating women from that time at a Suffragists protest, a sister org to Suffragettes, who didn't believe in violent actions.

Sahana thought everyone in British history was white but now she meets a group of women from over 100 years ago, including Lolita Roy, women

with brown skin like her, who have generally been overlooked by history but who played an important part in gaining women's right to vote.



How Families are Made

Author: Dr Amir Khan **Illustrator:** Donough O'Malley

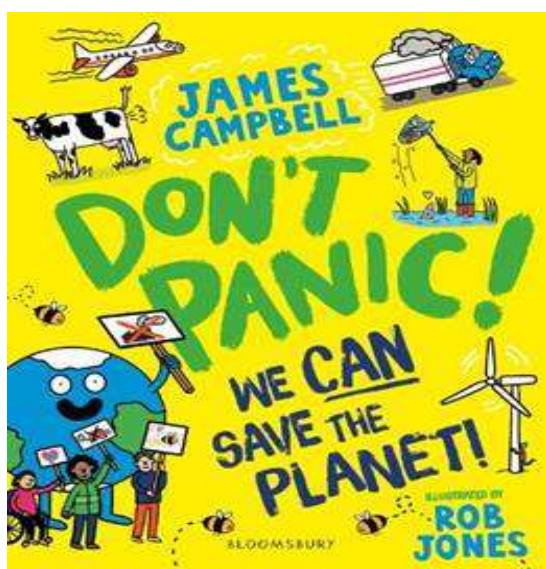
Dr Khan meets many families in his GP surgery, and this is his introduction to the various ways that a family can begin. He explains the biology of a man and a woman making a baby, then explores sperm donors, IVF and surrogates. There are interesting facts about a baby in the womb (at 31 weeks they're the size of a coconut!), and age-appropriate explanations of birth and Caesarean sections. The main message, though, is that whoever you live with, however you came into the world, your family is special.

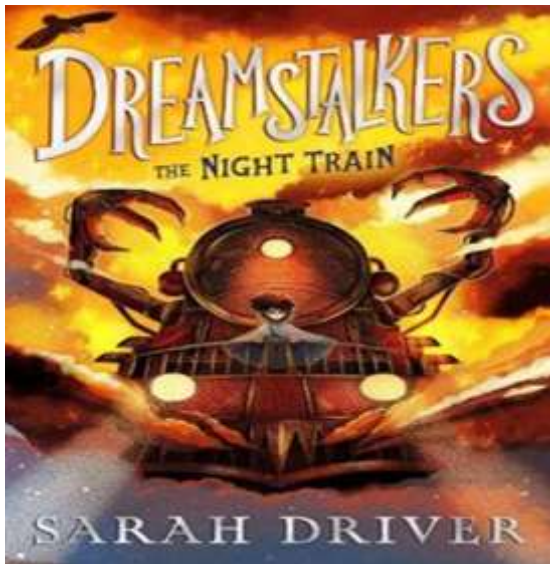
Don't Panic! We CAN Save the Planet!

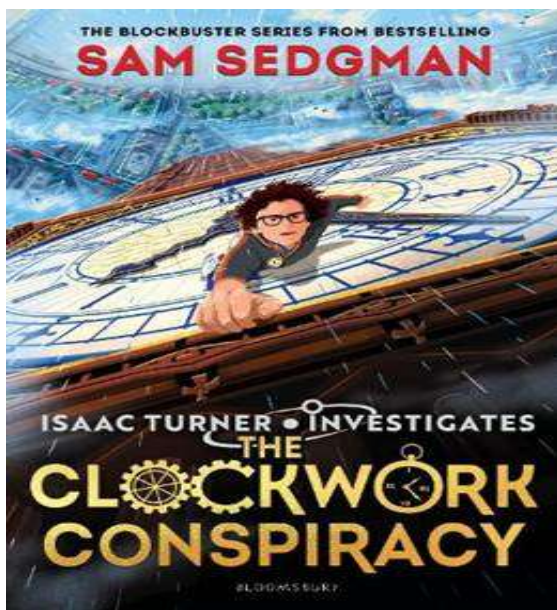


Dreamstalkers: The Night Train

this if scores of powerful mages can't?

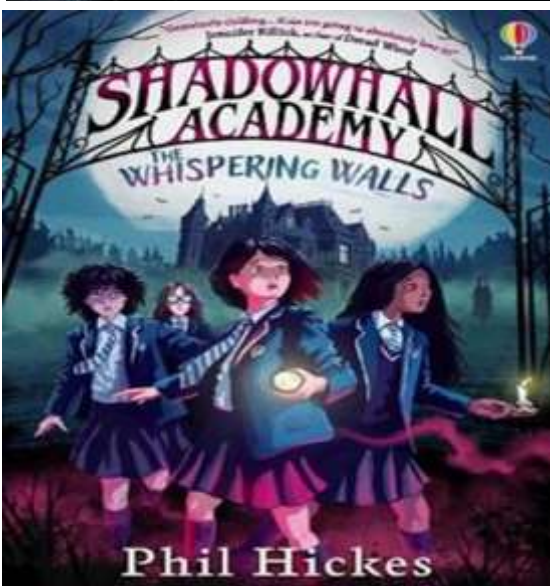


The Clockwork Conspiracy
