




Look what the children have been doing

Nursery

Reception

This week reception children have been thinking about how different colours represent emotions.





Children looked at the work of artists Picasso and Van Gogh to see how they connected the colour blue to the feelings of sadness.













Children in reception worked together to create patterns on fabric, inspired by African printing.

For RE, children heard the bible story of the 10 lepers. We talked about what happens to people when they are unwell and how we are thankful for all of those people who help us. Children went on to discuss 10 things that they are thankful for, such as family, friends and having food and shelter.





Year 1

This week has been a very busy week for the children as they have been working hard on their end of year assessments. Year 2
















Year 4

Taking a page out of his book, students in Year 5 had been tasked with rewriting our school's vision in their own words and using their own style of calligraphy.






















Year 6

Last week, Year 6 were very fortunate to have the organisation of Pathway, who came in and led a full day preparing children for their transition into secondary school. The day comprised of three sessions:

- Changes
- Choices
- Challenges

They looked at what is going to different in secondary school compared to primary school-greater independence/being the youngest in school once again and the uncertainty of something new but recognising that many others (including older siblings have already experienced this change. They discussed how change is not something to be feared but welcomed.

They also looked at the decisions they make both good and bad. We spent time discussing the importance of choosing the right friends and not bowing down to peer pressure. The children acted out various scenarios that they may encounter in Year 7.

Part of the day was spent looking at self-esteem and the importance of children preserving this when times are difficult for them.

We looked at the importance of the children being confident in who they are – in their identity – so that they can go with confidence into their new school.













NEU Industrial action

Notification of strike action school closure on Wednesday 5th July and Friday 7th July 2023.

We have been informed by **NEU Trade Union** that there will be days of strike action by their teacher members on **Wednesday 5**th **July and Friday 7**th **July 2023**. The dispute is with the Secretary of State for Education with regards to the NEU view that there has been a 'Failure to provide a fully funded above-inflation pay rise (as measured by September 2022 RPI). A fully funded pay rise is one that is funded by additional resources sufficient to provide the above-inflation pay rise' (NEU).

As Headteacher I have assessed the impact of the strike action on the school and have decided that the school will be closed. This decision has not been taken lightly and we regret having to close the school but have done this to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all pupils. Where possible remote learning tasks will be provided for pupils at home.

If your child receives Free School Meals (Year 3,4 & 5) or Universal Free School Meals (Year Reception,1&2), we are offering your child a sandwich meal for both days. These will be sent home with your child the days before strike action. Please make sure you refrigerate these meals. Please confirm your child's choice of sandwich filling on parentpay by Sunday 2nd July 2023.

Our sincere apologies for the difficulties that these arrangements will cause parents/carers but unfortunately these are circumstances beyond our control.

The school will open as normal on Tuesday 4th July and Thursday 6th July 2023.

NEU strike days free school lunches

Children in Reception and Keystage 1 who are receipt of Universal Free School Meals and children in Keystage 2 who are entitled to means tested Free School Meals, will be provided with a sandwich lunch for both strike days which will be taken home on Tuesday 4th and Thursday 6th July.

The sandwiches will contain a choice of cheese or tuna. Please log onto Parentpay to make the selection for your child's lunches for both days. The choices are:

- Cheese sandwiches for both days
- Tuna sandwiches for both days

If you do not log into Parentpay and make your selection by the evening of Sunday 2nd July your child will be given cheese sandwiches for both days. Please be aware that these sandwich meals must be kept refrigerated.

Unfortunately, our sports day on Thursday 29th June had to be postponed due to heavy rain. Weather permitting, we have rescheduled our Sports day to **Friday 14th July**.
