<u>Nursery</u>

The children have been learning about Harvest this week and have been thanking God for all the food that grows. We read the story of 'The Little Red Hen' and talked about how wheat is turned into flour to make bread. The children made their own bread using the playdough. We also wrote message to The Little Red Hen in the message centre.

All parents should have now received their Tapestry form. Thank you to those parents that have returned their forms and activated their Tapestry account. Tapestry is an important part of your child's learning journey and we encourage all parents to comment and contribute to it by uploading photos of your child's achievements at home. Please get in touch and speak to a nursery member of staff if you need help in activating your account.

Reception

We have had a busy week in Reception. Every day children have continued to learn some phase 2 phonemes and are now beginning to use these phonemes to sound out simple words.

For Maths we have been focusing on sorting and matching objects. Children have been working in groups to complete tasks such as finding the matching pairs of socks, using the vocabulary- matching, same, different.







For RE we discussed how everyone is unique. We talked about how we are all different and special. Children were able to talk about differences in people and say what things make them as special.

If you have not received an activation email or if you are having difficulty using Tapestry, please let your class teacher know.

Not only do we post homework and evidence of children's learning, we also are able to use Tapestry to send information directly to parents so please ensure that your account has been activated.

<u>Year 1</u>

This week children have learning about the achievement of some Black people as part of their Black History Month activity.

In Maths they have been using phrases like '**GREATER THAN**, **LESS THAN** and **EQUAL TO**' to compare objects and numbers including symbol for each phrase.

In PSHE, children went outside into the school grounds to find worms and created a simple wormery to enable them observe and understand how worms enrich the soil. In RE, they thought of and wrote questions they would like to ask God about 'Creation'. In Science, children went on a Science trail on the playground and school field to observe changes in the season of Autumn.

Parents please watch out! Your children will be getting their User name and passwords to enable them login to Purple Mash and Numbots soon. This will enable them access homework set on Purple Mash.

<u>Year 2</u>

This week the children in Year 2 had the opportunity to learn about some amazing black personalities eg Nelson Mandela and Stevie Wonder and how they overcame adversity, using their talents to improve the lives of others. They also took part in the "This Is Me" fashion show. It was lovely to see the children expressing themselves with a range of colours and styles from their countries of origin. The children really enjoyed it.

Year 3

Year 3 have been reading the story of James and the Giant Peach. In the story, the peach grew to become enormous and we were introduced to some human-sized insects who befriend James. In DT, we made pop-up cards to illustrate scenes from the story. Using oil pastels, we decorated the foreground and background. After that, we learned all about different moving mechanisms and added split pins to the insect's wings to make them movable.





<u>Year 4</u> Year 4 had a wonderful Survival Day on Tuesday 3^{rd} October in which they learnt about how you could survive in a rainforest. It was led by our talented teacher Mrs Thorp and her husband.

Year 5















As part of our liturgy unit in RE, Year 5's had the privilege of welcoming Rev Roxane to our class. During our lesson last week, we prepared a number of questions to be asked. Some examples included: 'Why is it important to go to Church when you can just pray at home?' 'Why is offering important?' and 'What is the significance of being baptised?'. Whilst some of the children asked the questions, the others wrote the answers to gather them for our Wonder Books. It was a great pleasure to have Rev Roxane come in to teach the Year Group about the importance of prayer and her experience as a Christian!

<u>Year 6</u>

Year 6 children spent an exciting day in Hyde Park last week. They worked with members of the Hyde Park teaching staff in the Look Out Discovery centre and learnt how to use a compass, map and key. They then set off on an orienteering adventure around Hyde Park to locate landmarks on an Ordnance Survey map, whilst searching for their next clue. A big well done to all the children for their excellent behaviour on the day. Our science topic this week was all about inheritance and how we inherit some characteristics from our parents. Children also learned the meaning of the following words:

- offspring
- fossil
- characteristics

Please test them and see if they can give you a clear, factual definition for each word.






Reading at home with your child.

We want to create a world where everyone is reading their way to a better life. Research shows that reading for pleasure can promote better health and wellbeing, aids in building social connections and relationships with others and is associated with a range of factors that help increase the chances of social mobility.

One in four children do not reach the expected level of reading by the age of 11. Many of these children will struggle to keep up at secondary school. *https://readingagency.org.uk*



Reading at home

'Sharing a book with a child is fun – it's a time for closeness, laughing and talking together. It can also give children a flying start in life and help them become lifelong readers.' *The Book Trust.*

The Book Trust's 'top tips' to make home reading successful

• Set aside some time

Find somewhere quiet without any distractions - turn off the TV/radio/computer.

Ask your child to choose a book

Sharing books they have chosen shows you care what they think and that their opinion matters. This means they are more likely to engage with the book.

• Sit close together

Encourage your child to hold the book themselves and/or turn the pages.

• Point to the pictures and ask questions

If there are illustrations, relate them to something your child knows. Ask them to describe the characters or situation or what will happen next. Encourage them to tell you the story by looking at the pictures. Please find the link to key questions to ask when reading below.

Encourage your child to talk about the book

Talking about the characters and their dilemmas helps children understand relationships and is an excellent way for you to get to know each other or discuss difficult issues. Give your child plenty of time to respond. Ask them what will happen next, how a character might be feeling or how the book makes them feel.

And lastly, above all - make it fun!

It doesn't matter how you read with a child, as long as you both enjoy the time together. Don't be afraid to use funny voices - children love this!















Animal Homes: Rainforest
