

#### Look what the children have been doing!

#### **Trinity**

The children in Trinity have been having lots of fun exploring different textures this week. We used flour and pasta to create patterns in the trough trays and loved getting our hands messy. We looked at how different materials create different sensations in our hands.



#### Nursery

This week our book has been 'The Train Ride' and the children have been very busy. They counted train carriages; made playdough trains; collaged trains and made trains using magnetic shapes. The children were able to talk about what the girl could see on her journey and used their imaginations to look through a train window. The children learnt all about the seaside and enjoyed relaxing on the beach with a play dough ice cream!!!

We also had a very special visitor, Iyaaz's dad, who works for Great Northern Railways. He spoke to the children about steam trains and electric trains, being safe on the train and using tickets to get on the train. Thank you for vising and sharing your knowledge with the children. Our maths this week has been the number 4 and the child have been using different resources to count 4.















#### **Reception**

This week we began to look at a book titled, 'Stanley's Stick' and we learned that Stanley's stick was once alive when it was part of the tree. We looked at different sticks in our outdoor area, described them and made stick pictures. We sorted objects into 2 groups-of living and non-living things.



For RE we discussed the question; **How can we care for our school?** We talked about how we are all responsible for keeping our school tidy and how it is important to be a good friend. We shared the story of the Good Samaritan who stopped to help a man in need. We worked on the composition of numbers during maths, finding different combinations of numbers that add up to values under 10.

#### <u>Year 1</u>

This week the children made weather vanes to further understand their topic of weather and how it can be measured. They worked collaboratively in small groups; using a range of materials to construct their weather vanes. We tested them outside and children evaluated their designs discussing whether their product was purposeful, appealing and met the design criteria. In maths, the children used their estimation skills to fill in number lines and consolidate their understanding of numbers up to 20. They were able to find the mid-way point on a number line and talked about the start and end of a number line. Children know that number lines don't always have to start at 0. In our RE sessions, the children are continuing to understand what it is like to live as a Jew; exploring Jewish practices and customs and considering its similarities and differences to other faiths. Next week, we will be looking at a story from the Percy the Park keeper series by Nick Butterworth titled, *'After the Storm'*. Children will explore stormy weather.



#### Year 2

We have been amazed by the ingenuity, creativity and sheer magnificence used to create high quality boats. The boats that we saw this week were absolutely incredible. The work and dedication that so many of you put in to creating them was inspiring. Many of the children expressed that their favourite part of making them was actually spending time with a parent or carer to talk, laugh, work and learn together on a purposeful activity that supported and built upon the work being completed in class. Some other ideas could include watching educational videos eg phonics and traditional stories on Youtube. Working together to complete writing homework activities and/or looking at mathematics in our everyday life eg count money at the shops, identify shapes or measure the weight of food ingredients.





#### Year 3

In our science lessons we have been learning about forces and magnets. The children enjoyed carrying out an investigation, testing to see how far objects can travel along different surfaces. The children learned that objects travel faster and further on smooth, flat surfaces because there is less friction. The cars did not travel very far on the field!



#### Year 4

Year 4 have been developing their writing by using fronted adverbials, noun phrases and a range of punctuation. In Science we have continued to learn more about solids, liquids and gases, the three states of matter. The children, continue to learn recorders with the talented Miss Morgan on Thursdays.

#### Year 5

This week in Science, Year 5 have learned a bit more of Earth's pearly satellite - the moon. We learned how scientists believe she was formed and how old they predict she is. We also learned how she gets her luminous glow and about her 8 phases when orbiting the Earth. Do you know the difference between a waxing crescent and a waning gibbous? Ask a Year 5 student to explain it to you!



#### Year 6

The Year 6 team would like to take this opportunity to remind parents to encourage children to do some independent study to help them fully prepare for SATs. Many of the children



have purchased CGP study guides and should be encouraged to regularly use them to help consolidate classroom learning and to fill gaps in their understanding. We would like to make you aware of a useful resource for maths SATs revision 'Genius Maths.' #### Children's absence

If your child is not in school, staff in the office may call to check on the reason for the absence. This is an essential safeguarding action and part of our duty to reduce absence from school. You may have seen a lot in the press about persistent absence and the damaging impact this can have a child's life chances so it is in your child's best interests to send them to school if they are well. Please treat the members of staff who calls you with respect and understand it is their duty to follow up absences. If they are confronted with rudeness or anger they have been instructed to stop the phone call and report the issue to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

#### Healthy Teeth

Some you may be aware of the Government's drive to improve the health of our children's teeth on BBC News this week. The news stated that according to their survey:

#### "Only a third of children in Wales have healthy teeth overall and this is lagging behind England, a major survey suggests.

Thousands of children have been examined every 10 years since 1973.

A third of children in Wales were said to have good oral health overall, which compares to 39% in England.

Decay was found in 52% of 12 year olds and 63% of 15 year olds, a slight improvement on the 2003 survey.

#### But around 70% of them reported problems with their teeth."
