Nursery

Our story this week has been Harry and his bucketful of dinosaurs. The children engaged in lots of exciting activities such as making playdough dinosaurs, digging for dinosaur bones like archaeologists and moving our bodies to the Dinosaur Stomp! The children were surprised by our visit from Mr T Rex!

In maths we learnt all about capacity and used wonderful vocabulary such as full, empty, nearly full and nearly empty.





Reception

This week Reception children have been learning about the importance of staying healthy, including having healthy teeth.

Children's awareness of oral health has been supported through activities and experiences that focus upon the importance of a healthy, low-sugar diet; regular tooth brushing and dental check-ups.



We continued to share the story 'Wild' by Emily Hughes. This week we focussed on the story setting, thinking about animals that live in the forest. We described and wrote lists of woodland animals.



For maths we have been working on the concepts of more than and fewer than. Children worked in groups to sort numbers into groups of more, less or equal to 6.

Our RE lesson focused on the story of the Last supper, exploring why Christians have bread and wine and thinking about special meals in our own lives.



Year 1

This week in year 1, we have been looking at letters! We've looked carefully at the features and structure of letters so that we can write our own. We have been reading the Jolly Postman by Allan Ahlberg and explored letters from different characters in the story which include Goldilocks and the Giant from Jack and the Beanstalk which feature in the book. The children are enjoying listening to traditional tales every day and exploring alternative versions of the tales they know so well. In RE, we are looking at the story of Noah and remembering the importance of having hope and showing resilience when things don't go according to plan. The children have shared experiences and heard others' stories to empathise and relate to.



Thank you for supporting the children with their phonics homework each week. It is making a big difference. Watch this space for some messy artwork to celebrate World Book Day next week!

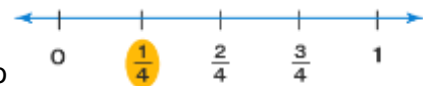
Year 2

This week the children took part in 'Eat Them To Defeat Them'. An initiative designed to promote the importance of a healthy diet, fruits and vegetables. The children really enjoyed the week as they learned about imports and exports and learned about the 'Three Sisters' seed planting methods. Children in Year 2 did really well to up their intake of vegetables this week. We were really proud to see asking for more vegetables as part of their main meals.

Year 3

This week in Year 3, the children have been learning about fractions! We have been learning to find fractions of shapes and can now order and compare fractions! We have also been exploring fractions on a number line.

In our RE lesson, we learned about the greatest commandment and thought about what commandments we would like to have which will benefit us at home, at school and in our wider community. The children had lots of lovely ideas!



Year 4

Year 4 have continued learning about Roman trade and trade routes in history.

In maths, they have been practising their addition and recognition of fractions.


They also observed the melting and solidifying of chocolate to illustrate states of matter in science.

The highlight of the week though was their athletics training at Lea valley Athletics Leisure Centre where the children were introduced to a long jump, javelin and track by professionals.

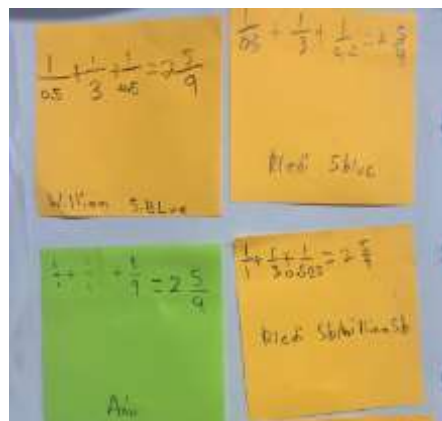


Year 5

Year 6

This has been a very busy week in Y6. The children have been sitting 'Mock SATs.' They all worked very hard and tried their best so a big well done to each and every one of them.

1. Encourage your child to read

Reading helps your child's wellbeing, develops imagination and has educational benefits too. Just a few minutes a day can have a big impact on children of all ages.

2. Read aloud regularly

Try to read to your child every day. It's a special time to snuggle up and enjoy a story. Stories matter and children love re-reading them and poring over the pictures. Try adding funny voices to bring characters to life.

3. Encourage reading choice

Give children lots of opportunities to read different things in their own time - it doesn't just have to be books. There's fiction, non-fiction, poetry, comics, magazines, recipes and much more. Try leaving interesting reading material in different places around the home and see who picks it up.

4. Read together

Choose a favourite time to read together as a family and enjoy it. This might be everyone reading the same book together, reading different things at the same time, or getting your children to read to each other. This time spent reading together can be relaxing for all.

5. Create a comfortable environment

Make a calm, comfortable place for your family to relax and read independently - or together.

6. Make use of your local library

Libraries in England are able to open from 4 July, so visit them when you're able to and explore all sorts of reading ideas. Local libraries also offer brilliant online materials, including audiobooks and ebooks to borrow. See [Libraries Connected](#) for more digital library services and resources.

7. Talk about books

This is a great way to make connections, develop understanding and make reading even more enjoyable. Start by discussing the front cover and talking about what it reveals and suggests the book could be about. Then talk about what you've been reading and share ideas. You could discuss something that happened that surprised you, or something new that you found out. You could talk about how the book makes you feel and whether it reminds you of anything.

8. Bring reading to life

You could try cooking a recipe you've read together. Would you recommend it to a friend? Alternatively, play a game where you pretend to be the characters in a book, or discuss an interesting article you've read.

9. Make reading active

Play games that involve making connections between pictures, objects and words, such as reading about an object and finding similar things in your home. You could organise treasure hunts related to what you're reading. Try creating your child's very own book by using photos from your day and adding captions.

10. Engage your child in reading in a way that suits them

You know your child best and you'll know the best times for your child to read. If they have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) then short, creative activities may be the way to get them most interested. If English is an additional language, encourage reading in a child's first language, as well as in English. What matters most is that they enjoy it.
